KEY HAZARD AND RISK CONTROLS – Safety, Environment and General

Safety

- Beware of correct lifting and sweeping techniques to protect from injury
- Use a disposable mask if working in a very dirty area or if you suffer an irritation while sweeping

Environment

Where practical recycle any waste picked up picked up prior to sweeping

General

- Do not sweep whilst in a crowded area or exposed food is in the area. This can disturb dirt/dust and risk contamination. If essential to sweep, use a dustpan and brush or small broom.
- Pick up loose litter prior to sweeping
- Shake out dust/dirt, wash and dry all equipment at end of shift

STEP BY STEP GUIDE

Pre-Operation

- Collect all equipment required from cleaner's storage area or cleaner's trolley
- Check condition of equipment for any damage or faults
- Apply all required PPE and make sure it is in good working condition
- Never pick up items such as syringes, medical wastes, spilt chemicals etc. in your hands

Instructions

- Pick up any large items from the floor and put into bin
- Use a clean, broad-brush broom. Check it has been cleaned before after last use
- It is best to use a banister brush and dustpan with a long handle so that the amount of bending that you have to do is minimised
- Avoid sweeping if in crowded area or exposed food area unless a spill occurs, or the floor area is a risk. If essential, then use a small head broom or dustpan and brush.
- Sweeping must be carried out in a straight line using overlapping strokes and pushing the broom away from you, not towards you.
- Sweep under benches and equipment. Light items of furniture can be moved and replaced after sweeping has been done. Hand brush and dustpan to be used for large items and for under desks sweep the dirt into the dustpan
- When sweeping large areas collect the dirt in a dustpan several times and empty into waste bin. This keeps dust levels down, which can be a health hazard.
- Dry brooms must be used on dry surfaces.
- Sweep one area at a time and clean broom to remove dust and dirt before continuing.

Finishing Up

- When finished, sweep the dirt and rubbish onto a dustpan with the banister brush and place into the bin.
- Return all equipment to cleaning storage area, storing brooms standing head up
- Do NOT leave broom lying on the floor as this is a trip hazard.
- Clean (wash) dustpan and waste containers at end of shift.

EMERGENCY REQUIREMENTS

- Are all work areas clean and tidy?
- Have you put all equipment and materials away neatly?
- Have you reported any near misses or incidents?
